


South led the \lozenge 8 and North won with the jack, cashed the ace and continued with the six. Expecting South to be void declarer ruffed with the \heartsuit A. He played a heart to the jack and cashed the king but when North discarded the game was up, -50.

South led the \triangle A and switched to the \bigcirc 8, North winning with the jack, cashing the ace and exiting with the three. Declarer pitched the \triangle 6 and when South followed he played a heart to the ace followed by a heart to the jack, +420, 10 IMPs and a great start to the match for the Springboks.

East kicked off with the $\clubsuit 4$ and West took the king and switched to the $\lozenge 4$, declarer winning with the jack and playing the $\clubsuit Q$. West took that and switched to hearts, playing the king, followed by the eight. East went back to diamonds, but declarer could pitch two hearts from his hand, one on the $\lozenge A$, the other on the $\clubsuit 10$ and that added up to +140.



West led the \lozenge 4 and when dummy's jack held declarer played the \clubsuit Q and West won with the king and played a second diamond, dummy's king taking the tricks as East, having played the \lozenge 5 on the first round completed a peter with the \lozenge 2. The \clubsuit J came next and East played the four, having followed with the eight on the first round. When West ducked, declarer could cross to the \spadesuit K, cash the \lozenge A and then take the spades for +600 and 10 IMPs.

If you are not playing Smith Peters it's a tough hand – the best East can do is to perhaps drop the \lozenge 9 and

♣8 at the first opportunity and hope West gets the suit preference-kind message.

We'll leave this match for a moment to look at a couple of boards that were not without interest:

North led the \lozenge 10 and declarer won with the king and played back the four. North ruffed, South following with the queen and switched to the \spadesuit 10. Declarer won with dummy's ace and played the \heartsuit J, covered by the queen and ruffed, followed by the \clubsuit 3. North won with the king and played a second spade and declarer won with the king, crossed to the \clubsuit Q and played the \heartsuit K for the ace and a ruff. He cashed the \clubsuit A and exited with the ten, North winning and playing a heart. Declarer could win with dummy's ten and cash the \diamondsuit A, but the last and setting trick went to North's \heartsuit 8.


Did you notice that North took all four defensive tricks?!



When East led the \heartsuit A, declarer had 12 tricks.

In their excellent Winning Notrump Leads, David Bird and Taf Anthias point out that it is often right to cash an ace against 6NT at match-points to prevent an overtrick, but provide a number of examples that illustrate it is riskier at pairs.

That's one point of interest from this deal, but the other is that 6♣ is perhaps better than 6NT. If East leads a diamond you can win with dummy's ace and after drawing trumps throw two hearts on the spades before playing a second diamond. On a passive back suit lead you have to guess the diamonds How many of the 38 pairs bid it? Not a one!

It's time to return to our featured match, where at the end there was some action again.



Here East opened straightforward $1 \diamondsuit$ and the game was bid very quickly.

North led the $\clubsuit 4$ and South won with the ace and returned the $\heartsuit 3$ for the four, queen and king. Declarer drew trumps, cashed his black suit winners and claimed, +620.

After off-shaped 1NT West did not decide to continue and it became the final contract.

South led the $\clubsuit6$ and North won with the ten and switched to the $\diamondsuit2$. South winning with the jack and playing the $\clubsuit7$. Declarer got that right, going up with dummy's king and he cashed out for +150, but 10 IMPs had flown out of the window giving England Mossop a 56-17 win that lifted them into fourth place.

OLYMPIC GOLD 1984


FROM THE ALMANAC OF POLISH BRIDGE

Polish team for 1984 Seattle Olympiad was rather young – the oldest player was 37, and two youngest both 29. The team – Krzysztof Martens, Tomasz Przybora, Jacek Romański (here LITHUANIA), Piotr Tuszyński (here POLAND 2 PAJĄK), Piotr Gawryś, Henryk Wolny – won the trials, where 4 teams competed for the first place till the last board.

Putting that team was surely good decision, as they won the gold medal, defeating France in the final.


Lev, not surprisingly, decided to re-open after $3 \diamondsuit$ with $3 \spadesuit$ and was raised to the spade game. Wolny decided to bid $5 \diamondsuit$, hoping there are no wasted spade values.

Gawryś guessed trumps – played a low to the king and made the contract. At replay the $3\diamondsuit$ was made.

The most difficult and dramatic step on the way to the Olympic gold was the semi-final against Austria. The line-up of AUSTRIA was: Fritz Kubak - Alexander Milavec, Wolfgang Meinl - Heinrich Berger (here AUSTRIA) and Jan Fucik - Franz Terraneo (TSC AUSTRIA). The match was played in four sixteen-boards segments. In the middle of the third the score was 113-50 for Austria. And at this point Fortune turned into the favor of the Poles. Our players started to play like

in a trance and before the last hand of the Olympic semi-final they were losing only three imps (140-143).

The final of the drama started:



Polish pair in the open room – Gawryś - Wolny – bid a heart game. East doubled, straightforward one down and 200 for Austria.

The situation looks rather hopeless, hard to see how we can win 4 imps here...

After artificial bidding, where North has shown 12-15 HCP, five spades and four hearts, Milavec has bid heart game, doubled by Tuszyński. The contract was the same as in the open and it was difficult to expect the difference.

Jacek Romański led \$5 (2nd/4th). Tuszyński won with the ace, cashed the ace of spades and continued with \$6.

The declarer, noticing that 3NT is laydown, while at 4% he has 4 top losers, probably lost his mind for a moment, ruffed with %7 and played %10. Tuszyński won with the king and played a spade once more. Now Milavec was really scared by ruff, and ruffed with the heart queen, hoping that Romański has 2-2 in majors, and played a trump to the nine. Tuszyński won with the ace and played fourth round of spades, promoting the %8.

Two down, 500 worth for Poland 7 imps and the ticket to the match for olympic gold..
