In Greek mythology, Mount Olympus is the home of the Gods.

The holders, Turkey, had made it to the semi-finals where they would meet USA Lusky. Could they earn the right to defend their title?

On Board 2 North was looking at:

♠ 2 ♥ KJ84 ♦ Q3 ♣ KQ9763


and saw the bidding start $1 \diamondsuit$ -Pass-1 \spadesuit .

Rigal doubled and retreated to 2♣ when his partner's 1NT was doubled.

Ince overcalled 2♣ directly. They both played in 2♣ doubled which cost -500. The EW hands were:

- ♠ KJ74 ♥ Q95 ♦ J9 ♣ AJ42 and
- ♠ A83 ♥ A1072 ♦ A6542 ♣ 10.

Left to their own devices EW would have probably reached 3NT, which is makeable, but hardly laydown. (One line involves a very pretty ending where North is thrown in with a club, the enforced club return squeezing South in spades and diamonds.


East led the \bigcirc Q for the king, ace and a ruff and declarer cashed the \bigcirc A, played a diamond to the king and then ran the \bigcirc J, East discarding the \spadesuit 4. Declarer continued with the \clubsuit 3 to the jack and continued with the ace, followed by the four, West winning with the king and returning a spade. Declarer ruffed and played a club but West ruffed and played another spade ensuring one down, -50.

There is a way to make eleven tricks – declarer must start clubs by playing the queen for the king and ace. Assuming East does not unblock the ten declarer can then exit with a low club. East wins but the force in spades is no longer effective. The winning line if East unblocks the $\clubsuit 10$ is pretty – declarer cashes a top diamond and the $\heartsuit Q$ and then exits with a heart. West wins and has to play a spade but declarer can pitch the $\diamondsuit Q$ and now East is endplayed. All a bit double-dummy?

A spade lead was going to defeat 3NT – North will take the \heartsuit A at trick two and switch to a club – so removing to $4 \diamondsuit$ was the best East could do.

North took the heart lead with the ace and switched

to the \clubsuit 10, declarer winning and playing a club to the ace. He pitched a spade on the \heartsuit K but South ruffed and exited with the \clubsuit Q. Declarer ruffed and tried the \diamondsuit K but North had two tricks in the suit for -100 and 13 IMPs. That meant the American team had run off 56 unanswered IMPs.



Declarer won, drew trumps and played the \diamondsuit 9 for the ten, king and ace. The spade return went to dummy's queen and declarer played a diamond to the jack finishing with eight tricks when the spades were blocked and diamonds 3-3, +360 and 10 badly needed IMPs.

South could have saved a trick by ducking the second round of diamonds.







That brought Turkey to within 7.9 IMPs in what had been a low-scoring set. There was to be no last-board drama as the Americans added 5 IMPs on a part-score deal to advance to the Final.

LAST BOARD, NOT MUCH DEPENDS ON IT...



Last year we tested the formula of the tournament where all the teams, also the losers of play off matches play till the end of the tournament and the third place is at stake. Feedback was very positive so we did not change it. I think it is better than the system commonly used in championships where teams which did not qualify to play off compete for 9th place in the best case.

Observing what was happening at 3RD PLACE SWISS I was watching table 1 match of the round 7 between POLAND AMBER BALTIC and AUSTRIA. Both teams started well at the qualification, but later lost their play off matches but they are still in competition. They were 1st/2nd at the Swiss at the moment and 3rd/4th at the whole tournament.

The boards were good for a lazy afternoon – only one double-digit swing.

Poles scored twice due to cautious bidding:


South led his 4th best \bigcirc 5. North won with the queen and returned a heart. South won with the ace and played heart one more time. Declarer won in hand (\spadesuit 7 from North), cashed \lozenge AQ and entered dummy with the \lozenge K. Now he did not play a master heart as there were no good discard from hand, but played a spade to the queen. South won and played a club. North won with the ace and return a club and declarer had to lose one more trick.

I wonder what would happen if declarer unblocks ♥J or 10 from hand at trick 1. If North continues a heart, declarer can play a second honor from hand now and contract can be made.

To set 3NT in that case North must return a club at trick 2.

At open room Omernik with East cards opened rather "panzer" 1NT (not the most beautiful, but anyway 18 HCP and good 5crd suit) and played there, making three for +150 and 6 imps.

At the penultimate board strong club system worked better than natural:





HOW TO OPEN OR DOWNLOAD BBO FILE OF THE MATCH


In 2021 BBO files of the matches were easily accessible directly from the website of the tournament. Now BBO works only through browsers, not in the client/server mode and it is slightly more difficult.

We received some questions prom tournament participants how they could find BBO files (*.lin) of the matches. It is possible, I dare say even quite simple. Here is step by step instruction:

- 1. Website of the tournament https://r.pzbs.pl/2022/tsc/web/ should be entered.
- 2. "RESULTS" tab should be clicked https://r.pzbs.pl/2022/tsc/0/
- 3. "ROUNDS RESULTS" should be chosen: https://r.pzbs.pl/2022/tsc/0/#000OO00001001002000000000
- 4. Round number should be clicked.
- 5. Appropriate match should be chosen and scores of the second part should be clicked:

7. Then you will be able to see match scorecard with link to each board at each table



8. You can download the lin file by clicking on the download link, open on your computer with BBO Viewer NetBridgeVue or Bridge Composer:



and replay each hand bid by bid, trick by trick:
