

Many years ago I was taking part in a knock-out quiz competition, where by a series of minor miracles our team had reached the final. We need to get the last question right to force a play-off. 'Who wrote Beethoven's tenth Symphony?' When the rest of the team turned to me, the supposed expert on classical music, I pointed out that the great composer had only penned nine. Was it the right answer? I'll leave you to ponder that while we examine the deals from the first two sessions of the final between Lithuania and USA Lusky. Lots of tough questions would be posed – could the players come up with the right answers?


EW could not come up with the right answer on this deal, declarer easily recording 11 tricks for +150.

If East tries $3 \spadesuit$ over 2NT and West bids $4 \clubsuit$ would East's $4 \diamondsuit$ see West advance to game?


I have a feeling that many of you will know my views about doubling with a balanced hand (especially opposite a passed partner), so I will not dwell upon West's contribution to the auction.

East led the \clubsuit 9 and West took the ace and switched to the \heartsuit Q. Declarer won and ducked a club, West continuing with the \heartsuit J. Declarer ducked and when West went back to spades he cashed his winners for +600.

As you can see, East needs to find a unlikely diamond (or heart) lead when West can win and switch to the \heartsuit Q. Interestingly when I gave the hand to the man on the Clapham omnibus he went for a heart!

West led the ♠8 and declarer won with dummy's king and played a club for the queen and ace. The trump return was taken in hand and when a diamond to the jack held declarer cashed the ♠10 and then played a diamond to the nine and king. With the ♣I onside there were ten tricks, +170.

North had a close decision over 3♣ – are you surprised he was not seduced by the lure of a vulnerable game.



There were still three hearts to lose, -100 and a 9 IMP loss.

If North cashes the \bigcirc K and then plays a low heart South can play diamonds, eventually securing a trump promotion for -500.

Declarer won West's heart lead in dummy, cashed the \Diamond AJ and then ran the \clubsuit Q. West won and switched to the \spadesuit 5 for the queen and ace and declarer played back the \spadesuit J. East won, but declarer could cross to dummy with the \Diamond 10 and pitch a club on the \spadesuit 10, +600 and 11 IMPs.

With only two flat boards it had been a combative set, Lithuania taking it 47-29.

By contrast, the second session saw points change hands on only five deals. These were the two that really mattered:

North led the \$10 and declarer won with the queen and played a spade to the nine. When it held he continued with a heart to the king and a spade for the queen and ace. Three rounds of hearts followed, a diamond going from dummy as North ruffed in. That meant 11 tricks, +650.

Aside from the obvious risk involved in leading away from a king, a diamond lead should defeat $4 \spadesuit$. South wins, cashes a second trick in the suit and then switches to a club.

After the same start West cashed the \clubsuit A at trick two and continued with the five. Declarer won and ran the \heartsuit J, +620 and 10 IMPs.

The set score was 29-2 and USA Lusky enjoyed an overnight lead, 58-49.

To answer the question I posed earlier, Beethoven's 10th symphony was usually attributed to Brahms. However, it later transpired that Beethoven had sketched out the idea of another symphony before his death in 1827. That gave rise to Beethoven X: The AI Project which you can read about it at www.beethovenx-ai.com.



BATTLE FOR BRONZE

In the last round of 3RD PLACE SWISS at table one leaders – CANADA CZYŻOWICZ (137.55 VP) met POLAND MARKOWICZ (137.61 VP). POLAND AMBER BALTIC, currently third, had 134.48 VP, while the next competitor was at some distance – 128.27 VP, so it looked that most likely one of those teams might win.

The Canadian team did not qualify to play offs and in the Swiss they advanced from 23rd place (7th from non-advancing teams) to the top. The Poles could be on quite different wavelength – they lost semifinal in very last board.

At first board Włodek Starkowski showed excellent card reading:

Ten from dummy, \clubsuit 2 from West. Declarer won with the ace and cashed five round of spades (both opponents retained three hearts), entered dummy with \lozenge A and played \lozenge 10, won by East with the jack. East exited with a club, declarer ruffed the king and had to lose two more heart tricks.



Here also East led \lozenge J, declarer finessed. West won and returned \lozenge 2 (this suit preference card located \heartsuit A at East hand). East ruffed and played \clubsuit 5. When the ten from dummy was covered with the king, declarer got his chance. He won with the ace and played all the trumps. East discarded three hearts and a club, but when declarer played a diamond to the ace, he was caught with squeeze. He had to keep two clubs, so he left the bare ace of hearts. Włodek played a heart, ducked in hand and the contract was made.

+420 and 11 imps for POLAND MARKOWICZ.

A few boards later there was a problem how to pay less after unlucky take out double...



At both table after North's pass, East opened $1 \diamondsuit$, South doubled and West redoubled.

North could not be too happy with his spade jack surrounded by the collection of spots...

Gartaganis bid his longest suit -2 and played there, of course doubled:



After your pass partner opens $1 \spadesuit$. You responds 1NT and he rebids $2 \clubsuit$. What is your bid?

Life is hard... You cannot bid $2 \spadesuit$ with singleton, for 2NT you lack 1 or 2 points and a heart honor, for $3 \clubsuit$ or $2 \diamondsuit$ one card in the suit...

Marcinski passed.

Declarer made 10 tricks for +130.

Who is to blame? Should West rebid 3♣ or 2NT? Both those bids surely are not from the text book. 3♣ forces to game, but after that rebid heart fit can be easily missed. Looking at this accident I understand why so many top pairs started to use some versions of Gazzilli (World No 3, Jacek Kalita told some time ago that this is the most important convention of his system).

May be with East hand $2 \diamondsuit$ was lesser evil?

In open room West, playing Polish Club opened 1♣ (11-13 balanced, natural, 5+♣, 15+ HCP or strong, 18+HCP, any).

North made a full use of vulnerabilities $-1 \spadesuit$ was a nice attempt to steal the board, but it did not make life very hard for East/West as East had easy way to show his strength and distribution.

Club was led and declarer had 10 easy tricks. +630 and 11 imps for POLAND MARKOWICZ.

POLAND MARKOWICZ won the match 44-15 imps, gaining 17.68 VP. It was much more than enough to win 3RD PLACE SWISS. Second place for SWEDEN after 39-0 in last match against BELGIUM, third for AUSTRIA who won at second table with POLAND AMBER BALTIC 13.43-6.57



HOW TO OPEN OR DOWNLOAD BBO FILE OF THE MATCH


In 2021 BBO files of the matches were easily accessible directly from the website of the tournament. Now BBO works only through browsers, not in the client/server mode and it is slightly more difficult.

We received some questions prom tournament participants how they could find BBO files (*.lin) of the matches. It is possible, I dare say even quite simple. Here is step by step instruction:

- 1. Website of the tournament https://r.pzbs.pl/2022/tsc/web/ should be entered.
- 2. "RESULTS" tab should be clicked https://r.pzbs.pl/2022/tsc/0/
- 3. "ROUNDS RESULTS" should be chosen: https://r.pzbs.pl/2022/tsc/0/#000OO00001001002000000000
- 4. Round number should be clicked.
- 5. Appropriate match should be chosen and scores of the second part should be clicked:

7. Then you will be able to see match scorecard with link to each board at each table



8. You can download the lin file by clicking on the download link, open on your computer with BBO Viewer NetBridgeVue or Bridge Composer:
