

LET THE GAMES BEGIN

Readers with long memories might recall that in the previous edition of the Transatlantic Seniors Cup teams representing England and Sweden also clashed in the opening round. Last year Sweden managed a demolition job, winning by 60 IMPs. Marek thought it would be a good place to start – and his instinct did not let him down.

It is generally considered to be the case that the players like to have an opportunity to settle in, perhaps starting with one or two deals that are not too testing. The same is true for commentators and journalists, but as you can see the opening board was not straightforward.

Whilst the majority were prepared to open the North hand $2 \diamondsuit$ or $2 \heartsuit$, there were several votes for a pass. In the match between Israel and USA Greenspan Dani Cohen and Yosi Engel were one of a select few to bid game: after $1 \clubsuit - (Dble) - 1NT - (2 \heartsuit) - 5 \clubsuit$ South's double saw them score +550 and collect 12 IMPs against the failing 3NT (doubled) that was reached in the other room.

Far be it for me to criticize, but I have never been a fan of making a takeout double with a balanced hand

(and here you are facing a passed partner). 10 players were happy to double, only three being content to go quietly.

East's overcall was automatic but what about South's $3\heartsuit$ and the re-opening double?

It looks obvious to bid 3] when you are more or less sure of a nine-card and it was the choice of 14 players. Scotland White's Roy Bennet was the only player to pass – and that led to a gain of 8 IMPs when 3♣ was passed out while NS were three down in 4♥ doubled in the other room.

East's re-opening double was not the popular choice, the majority favouring $3 \spadesuit$.

However, very few pairs reached 5♣.

Defending 3% doubled West led the $\clubsuit 8$ and declarer won with the ace, pitched a spade on the $\clubsuit J$ and exited with the $\spadesuit J$. West won and returned the $\spadesuit 8$, declarer ruffing in dummy and playing a diamond. East took the ace and exited with the nine, West winning and, seeing no danger, continuing with the $\diamondsuit 7$. When East could not ruff declarer won, ruffed a spade, ruffed a diamond and played the $\clubsuit 4$. West, down to $\heartsuit QJ108$ discovered he could score only one trump trick, as when he ruffed with the $\heartsuit J$ declarer underruffed with dummy's six for a dramatic +530.

To avoid this grizzly fate West must exit with his remaining spade. Declarer can ruff in dummy and come to hand with a diamond, but when he ruffs another spade West disposes of his last diamond ensuring one down.

East would have been better to exit with a black card after taking the \Diamond A, but as is often the case the biggest mistake came at trick one. If East withholds the \clubsuit K declarer has no way to secure more than seven tricks.


That's only half a deal and I'm already exhausted!

If North leads a heart, and hearts will be continued without diamond switch from North, 3NT will make in a canter (that happened 5 times) but when North started with the \diamondsuit 5 the defenders were one step ahead. Declarer won with the king and played a club for the queen, king and four, South winning the next club and returning the \heartsuit 2 for the queen and king. North played back a second diamond and the defenders were assured of five tricks, -100 and 10 IMPs

If West leads a spade then in theory 3NT should go down. However, the defenders have to be careful and on no less than eleven occasions declarer record at least nine tricks.

The cards were lying well for declarer and after a spade lead to the ace and a second spade declarer was soon claiming, losing a trick in each suit, -100.

West led the ♠4 for the king and East returned the two. Having won with dummy's ace declarer cashed five clubs. West discarded two hearts and two diamonds (East had followed with the two, four and seven, perhaps suggesting diamond values) and declarer had to settle for eight tricks, -100 and another 5 IMPs went away.

On the next deal NS held

- ♣ AKQ65 ♥ AKJ643 ♦ ♣ Q10 (North) opposite
- ♦32 ♥ Q8752 ♦ AJ9 ♣ AK8 (South).


With South opening 1° it was no surprise to see almost everyone bid a grand slam. I say 'almost' because three pairs stopped in 6° (one after the sequence 1° -(2NT)- 6° , West's bid being based on

♦ 4 ♥ 10 ♦ KQ1085 **♣** 976543)

and two suffered disasters, one of them bidding $1NT-(Dble^*)-2 \diamondsuit *-2NT-3 \heartsuit -4 \clubsuit -4 \spadesuit$, which resulted in the loss of 17 IMPs when declarer went two down and scored up against -1510. The other catastrophe occurred when North responded $5 \diamondsuit$ to $1 \heartsuit$. No doubt he intended it as exclusion, an excellent idea were that to be the case, but when South assumed it was to play and passed it meant 18 IMPs changed hands.

Both our NS pairs recorded +1510.

East led the \bigcirc K and switched to the \spadesuit 5, declarer winning with the jack and exiting with the \bigcirc 2. East won with the nine and when West discarded the \clubsuit 4 he switched to the \spadesuit 6. Declarer took the ace, ruffed a diamond, ruffed a club and ruffed a heart. West overruffed and exited with a diamond forcing declarer to ruff in dummy. That meant he had to lose a trick to the \spadesuit 10 and another heart, two down, -300. That is what should have happened, but it says that when declarer ruffed a club with the \spadesuit 3 East discarded a heart, -100.

Double dummy East can ensure two down by playing a low heart at trick two, but as the play went and the cards lie declarer can always get up to eight tricks by assuming trumps are 2-2, playing to ruff two diamonds.


South led the \clubsuit 6 and North ruffed dummy's ace and switched to the \heartsuit 3. Declarer won with the ace, pitched a spade on the \heartsuit K and continued with the \heartsuit Q, ruffed by the \S 9 and overruffed by dummy's jack (pitching the \spadesuit K is the way to escape for one down). Declarer now cross-ruffed clubs and hearts and then exited with the \spadesuit K. North won, cashed the \diamondsuit A and then played a spade for two down, -500 and 12 IMPs.

At the half the score was 15-14 in favour of Sweden.

Board 14 was passed out in the Open Room, but they were more ambitious in the replay, NS reaching 4% with

- ♠ KQJ3 ♥ Q95 ♦ 732 ♣ K76 facing
- **♦**76 ♥ J87632 ♦ A9 **♣** A108.

That finished one down nudging Sweden back into the lead by the 2 IMPs they gained.



South led the \triangle A and declarer ruffed and played the \lozenge 7 (which might be frowned upon in some circles) North taking the ace and returning the \triangle 5. Declarer ruffed and played a heart, South winning with the ten and switching to the \triangle 3 for the jack, queen and a ruff. Hoping for a reasonable trump break declarer played a heart (a top diamond saves a trick as it happens) but North won and returned the \triangle Q. Declarer ruffed and played the \lozenge 10 but South won and played a spade. Declarer ruffed and played the \lozenge Q but North could ruff, draw the last trump and cash the \triangle A for four down, -800.

East led the $\lozenge 2$ and declarer won with the ace and played the $\lozenge 2$, winning in dummy as East discarded the $\lozenge 5$. A club to the nine saw East part with the $\lozenge 2$ and declarer went to dummy with a second spade, pitched a spade on the $\lozenge K$ and played the $\lozenge 10$. When West threw the $\spadesuit 8$ declarer won with the ace, cashed the $\spadesuit Q$ and played the $\image Q$ covered by the king, ruffed and overruffed. Declarer had to lose another trump trick, but that was all, +750 but another 2 IMP loss.

East led the ♠5 and declarer took the ace, ruffed a spade and played a club, West winning with the queen and returning the ♦6. Declarer won with the ace, ruffed a spade, ruffed a club, drew trumps and played a heart, finishing with 11 tricks as East had pitched a heart on the third round of spades, +150.

North led the \lozenge K for the four, five and six. Switching to the \clubsuit J at this point gives the defenders a shot at three down, but North cashed the \lozenge A and continued with the queen. Declarer ruffed and played spades, his losing heart going on a club for +620 and 13 IMPs. You will have realised that having cashed two diamonds North must switch to a heart. South could perhaps have helped by following to the second diamond with the jack.

Sweden went on to win 33-15, 14.2-5.8 VP.
