South led the ♠2 and North won and switched to the ♥9. Declarer won with the ace and played a club to the ten. When it held he came to hand with a heart and ran the ♣Q, soon claiming his contract, +400.

West's alternative to 4NT would be to double, which in this case results in a straightforward -500. It was the final contract on eight occasions.

With an ace and a degree of support for all three suits West might have done more – 4NT is one possibility. It meant Israel were first to strike, to the tune of 6 IMPs.

Only four pairs failed to bid game. 7 pairs tried 3NT – and five of them made it.

East led the ♠10 and declarer won with the ace, played a heart to the ace, ruffed a heart, played a diamond to the queen and ruffed another heart. With hearts 3-3 and trumps 3-2 he now had all the tricks, +1390.

Here too East led the ♠10 and this time declarer won with dummy's king, unblocked the ♣K, came to hand with a spade, ruffed a club and drew trumps, West discarding the ♥4. When declarer cashed the ♣A he would have been expecting to be able to claim, but East threw a spanner in the works when he contributed the ♠2. Declarer cashed the ♦9 and West discarded the ♥J. On the last diamond he pitched the ♣J. When declarer played a heart to the ace West's far sighted defence delivered -200 and a 17 IMP reward.

Having ruffed a club declarer might have ruffed a spade and then played another club. If East ruffs, declarer overruffs and cashes all his trumps, squeezing West for an overtrick. Paulo Lambardi and David Kendrick both followed this line.

4 pairs went down in 6♦ after a spade lead.

On Board 4 both EW pairs bid 6♥ with

Only one pair failed to bid a slam and four went 'all in' by bidding 7♥. South held all three hearts - is that enough to suggest that North will have length in spades in which case you must play South for the singleton/doubleton ♠10?

No-one made 7♥ but five declarers scored an overtrick in 6♥.

North led the ♥10 for the jack, queen and ace and declarer continued with the ♣8. When dummy's queen held he pitched the king of clubs on the ♠A and could afford the safety play of a heart to the eight for +980 and 11 IMPs.

Only three pairs reached 6♦, which looks better than 6♥, while 17 pairs stopped short of slam.

West led the ♠2 and having won with dummy's ten declarer played a club to the king and ace, West returning the ♠Q. Declarer won with the ace, played a heart to the king and cashed the top clubs. When the ten failed to appear he played a heart to the ace and cashed the ♠K for seven tricks.

East led the ♦A and continued with the king, declarer ruffing and cashing the ♣A. When East followed innocently with the two declarer cashed the ♥AK and then played a heart to the jack. When East missed his last chance to dispose of the ♣K declarer cashed three spades and exited with a club, the enforced ruff and discard meaning +450.

Remarkably just a few days earlier Andrew Robson, writing in *The Times* had descried a hand where a defender had failed to unblock holding a doubleton king.

This defensive play always looks obvious – afterwards. The only advice I can offer is that when declarer does something unexpected be on your guard – here the play of the ♣A should sound a warning note.

West led the ♥3 and East won with the ten and returned the seven, declarer ruffing and playing the ♦9. West won with the ten and played the ♥6, declarer ruffing and playing the ♦8. East won with the king and played the ♥A, declarer ruffing and ruffing a diamond with the ♠10. East overruffed and played two rounds of spades which meant four down, -800.

Having worked hard to set up a diamond ruff declarer can save a trick by not trying to take it – exiting with a trump instead, relying on the a good guess in clubs.

The defenders can avoid this obscure possibility if West finds the crocodile coup of rising with the ♦A on the second round of the suit. He then continued with a high diamond and East overruffs dummy and plays two rounds of spades to ensure -800.

Which adjective would you choose to describe East's dramatic leap to 7♥?

South led the ♠3 and declarer won with the six, played a heart to the king, a heart to the ten, ruffed a spade, drew trumps and claimed, +2210 and 16 IMPs.

Had South led either red suit declarer would have found it impossible to make 7♥ – indeed, 13 players went down in 6♥ (not impossible, especially when South has not bid). On a club lead he must guess to play dummy's queen.

Just to illustrate the awkward nature of 6♥ suppose South leads a diamond and declarer wins with the king, ruffs a spade and plays a heart to the ten. If he now ruffs a spade with dummy's ♥9 and cashes the]K he goes down as long as South discards a minor-suit card. Ruffing the second spade with the ♥K and then playing a heart to the jack is a winner, as declarer can then play two rounds of trumps and claim. That was the line adopted by Glenn Eisenstein (after South had opened 2♠).

In the match between Switzerland and England Hackett both teams reached 6♥. Paul Hackett had to declare after South had opened 2♠ (♠+♣/♦). South led the ♦7 and declarer ruffed a spade, cashed the ♥K (South pitching a spade), played a heart to the ten, ruffed another spade and played the ♦A followed by the queen. North ruffed and declarer overruffed, drew the last trump and played two rounds of spades. South won and had to play a club and declarer put up dummy's queen to flatten the board.

If South holds on to his spades, pitching a diamond declarer cannot afford to ruff another spade. He must play on diamonds. If North ruffs the third round declarer overruffs, and must then cash the ♣A and play a second club. If South wins and exits with a club declarer wins in dummy and plays diamonds. A spade is no better, as declarer wins, ruffs a spade, takes a discard on the ♣Q and then plays a diamond.

There is a beautiful variation if North refuses to ruff in, instead discarding two spades and only ruffing the last diamond. Declarer overruffs and draws the last trump. South, forced to hang on to three spades will be down to one club so declarer cashes the ♣A and then exits with a low spade to endplay South.

Belgium had only scored on two of the last ten deals, but they were enough to take the half 24-7 and the match 73-19, 19-1 VP.

Israel found themselves in Dire Straits, while Belgium had emerged as the Sultans of Swing.

HOW TO OPEN OR DOWNLOAD BBO FILE OF THE MATCH

In 2021 BBO files of the matches were easily accessible directly from the website of the tournament. Now BBO works only through browsers, not in the client/server mode and it is slightly more difficult.

We received some questions from tournament participants how they could find BBO files (*.lin) of the matches. It is possible, I dare say even quite simple. Here is step by step instruction:

1. Website of the tournament
