I have a vague memory that Bobby Wolff was once involved in a similar deal to this one where in response to partner's Lightner double the answer was to lead from a three-card suit. From West's point of view partner was much more likely to be void in diamonds and he led the ♦7 which resulted in a quick claim and +1660.

If West had risked leading the ♥K East's three would have been a pointer to the right continuation and -500.

There was a time when East's 1NT would have been used to show the unbid suits, but in these days of light opening bids and wafer-thin responses the trend is for it to show a strong balanced hand.

East led the ♦7 and declarer took dummy's ace, ruffed a diamond and advanced the ♥Q for the king and ace. After a second round of the suit declarer forced out the ♣A and emerged with 11 tricks, +200.

Another missed opportunity. Perhaps 5♠ would have well over 5♦.

Discussing the hand with the au pair she reminded me that I have frequently referred to a method of responding to 2NT that was developed by Sally Brock and Sandra Landy. Using those methods West would respond 3♠ forcing East to bid 3NT. Then West would bid 4♣ to show both minors with longer clubs (at least 6-5). After East's 4♦ West's 4♠ cue bid would give EW every chance of reaching 7♣.

North led the ♥A and when South followed with the seven he continued with the king, declarer ruffing, cashing the jack and king of spades and then playing the ♦6 to dummy's king. When it held declarer exited with a diamond and North won with the queen and continued with the ace. Had someone rung a bell at this point South might have found the brilliant defence of ruffing and switching to a club but when he discarded a heart North was endplayed, forced to lead away from the ♣K or offer up a ruff and discard, -420.

South had petered in spades – if that suggest the ability to ruff something North might have risen with the ♦A and then returned the five.

He took the spade return with dummy's jack, played a diamond to the king, pitched a diamond on the ♠K and took the diamond finesse, +420.

West switched to the ♣5 and declarer won perforce with dummy's ace and played the ♥J. East hooped up with the ace and returned the ♠3 for the nine and ten. Another spade knocked out the king and all declarer could do was cash his red winners. That looked like two down, but a discarding error gave declarer a trick with dummy's ♥10 so -50 and 10 IMPs away.

East led the ♦9 and West won and switched to the ♥6. Declarer won with dummy's ace and played a spade for the jack and ace, East returning the ♣6. Declarer won with dummy's ace and played a second spade, West winning and trying the ♥J. Declarer won, ruffed a diamond with the ♠Q, ruffed a heart (forcing West to pitch a club), cashed the ♠10 and drew trumps, squeezing East in hearts and clubs for +620.

The only way to defeat 4♠ is for the defenders to start with three rounds of spades. If declarer then plays a diamond West must duck!

East led the ♦3 and West took the ace and switched to the ♣Q declarer winning with dummy's ace and playing a spade to the ten and ace. He won the club return with dummy's king and played a second spade and West won and missed the chance to play a third round of the suit, which would have left declarer a trick short as there is no longer a squeeze.

However, when he returned the ♣J declarer ruffed with the ♠J. He then ruffed a diamond and drew the last trump, but found he was a trick short when the diamonds did not break, -100 and a loss of 12 IMPs.

That was a little unlucky, but ruffing the third club with the ♠6 retains some winning options.

The first two tricks were identical to those in the other room, but here South continued with a third spade and declarer won with the nine discarding a diamond from dummy. When he continued with a diamond to the king North won and returned the]7, South winning with the queen and switching to the {Q for two down, -200 and 13 IMPs.

Lithuania took this dramatic set 61-32 and went on to win 79.1-55.

Things were much quieter in the contest between Turkey and England Hackett. This was the only double digit swing in the course of the first 16 deals:

West led the ♣Q (after all they are a pip stronger than the diamonds) and declarer ducked, won the next club with dummy's ace and ran the ♥9. When it held he played the ♥Q then played a spade to the ace, West discarding a club. Declarer cashed the ♥A then pitched a diamond on the ♥10 and was assured of 10 tricks, +620.

West led the ♦Q and when East played the king declarer ducked. He took the next diamond and cashed the ♠K, West pitching the ♥4. At this point declarer can unblock the spades, cross to the ♣A and run the ♥9. When the finesse succeeds, declarer can cash the ♠Q (essential to stop East scoring two trump tricks via a promotion) and then play on hearts for ten tricks. However, declarer played a club to dummy's nine and East won with the ten and returned the ♠5. Declarer won, crossed to the ♣A and ran the ♥9. He appeared to be on track for ten tricks, (in this variation after three rounds



of hearts declarer cashes unblocks the spades and then plays the fourth heart forcing a return into dummy's ♠Q9). However, after the nine held he ruffed a club and cashed the ♥A which meant there were only nine tricks, -100 and a 12 IMP swing.

The eagle-eyed reader will have spotted that when declarer plays a club at trick four West must put up an honour. Declarer has to win (otherwise West can play a diamond). Now the defenders should prevail via the eventual promotion of East's ♠10.

Turkey led 22.1-11 at the half.

The teams traded 36 IMPs early in the second half, Turkey increasing its lead by 6 IMPs, then came:

West led the ♣7 and East put in the ten, declarer winning with the jack and playing a diamond for the jack and queen. East return of the ♥3 went for the king and ace and West switched to the ♠6 for the five, eight and ace. Declarer played a diamond to the ten, cashed the ace and came to hand with the nine. West discarded a heart which simplified declarer's task, as it allowed him to score four hearts and squeeze East for a couple of overtricks, +660.

If West does not pitch a heart declarer cashes the ♥ coming down to ♠Q9 ♣AQ and can then end-play East in either suit.

A sporting double of 3NT (for a spade lead) would have paid a significant dividend!

No problem? *Go with the third hand high and cry*, as we say in Poland?

With ♣AQx queen is the „standard procedure”. But with ace-jack it is less usual. However, after a moment of thought...

In practice it is not possible for declarer to make the contract without diamond tricks, so you keep things under control. In this situation you should make every possible effort to ensure club tricks. Playing the jack in trick one practically does that job in case declarer has any combination of 4 club cards with king or queen and one high spot - 9 or 10. If declarer has Q109x you can do nothing, as winning the ace and switching to a heart is against the odds.

Six defenders holding West's cards who saw partner lead a club against 3NT put in the jack, no doubt deci-

ding that partner's clubs were unlikely to be headed by the ♣K109. It was a winning line, as the whole board was:

Hand was reported by Jan Kolen of Netherlands, who happened to be the victim (sitting West) of his compatriots Bas van der Hoek and Leo Hofland.

When the ace was played at trick 1 and at trick 2 ♣J was played and covered by the queen, there was still a winning defence – East should withhold the ♣K – how he is supposed to work that out is beyond me, so full praise to Belgium's Jean Pierre Lafourcade, who found the way.

Next letter is an answer to my question at the end of the article about the following hand. I will remind you part of it:

If you are an odds addict, you will probably choose 6♥. But some „fantasisti”, as Italians *tifosi* say,



would prefer grand slam in clubs. What are the chances to make it? Clubs 4-3 (62%) and hearts 3-2 or 4-1 with 4 at East hand. Also singleton heart queen is good. Sometimes if clubs are 5-2, but 10 is falling and queen of hearts behaves you can make it as well. I think it gives 60% or slightly. It is borderline, as grand slam should be bid when it has (not vulnerable) more chances.

Piotr Stopa, nuclear physicist of Institute of Nuclear Physics of Polish Academy of Science, playing in TSC tournament in POLAND TS WISŁA team, send me much more detailed analysis:

At Bulletin No 8 you suggested, that odds for nonvulnerable grand slam should be better than 15;11. In fact it should be 14:11, because when you do not make it (1 down) loss is 14 imps, even if at the other table small slam would be made (in NT or hearts – 990+50). But what is even more interesting – this simple estimation is correct only if small slam is 100%. Otherwise expected value is different. If probability of making the small slam is $P(6)$, then chances of grand slam should be better than $P(7)$: $P(7) > (2+12*P(6))/25*P(6)$. If we assume $P(6) = 1$ than $P(7)$ should be higher than $14/25 = 56\%$

At the board from the article, South player could estimate then $6\heartsuit$ can be made if hearts are 3-2 in case partner has no jack, or 4-1 distribution with the $J10$ (we can exclude rare case of the second-round club ruff after spade lead, obvious from the bidding). It gives $P(6\heartsuit)$ about 75%, and in this case odds for $7\clubsuit$ should be higher than 59.7%.

So, $7\clubsuit$, which you have estimated for about 60% is a borderline contract and decision to bid it or not should base on tactitcs – „do we want the swing, or not?”

Piotr Stopa also contributed a story about slightly curious event which has happened in one of the boards of the Round 7. It shows the power of Jack, not the Black Jack but the card called Jack.

In Latvia-Poland TS Wisla match, North was declarer of 3NT after $1\heartsuit$ opening and opponents silent. Łukasz Lebioda (East) led $\spadesuit 4$ won by the ace. Club king, queen and nine followed. I (West) ducked twice, Łukasz discarded $\heartsuit 7$ and $\diamond 6$.

Ducking $\clubsuit 9$ wouldn't help as declarer could unblock $\heartsuit K$, clear clubs and make the contract with the help of simple diamond finesse. Therefore, I took club ace ($\diamond 9$ from East) and switched to spade queen, disrupting declarer's communication. After spade king declarer played heart to the king and cashed club tricks. Łukasz discarded $\heartsuit Q$ and $\diamond 10$. The ending was:

Declarer could make the contract playing ace and queen of diamonds, but he played a low diamond instead... Łukasz took the trick with $\diamond J$, cashed jack and nine of spades and lead his last jack, this time in hearts, winning last, setting trick with heart 9, and the contract ended 1 down.

Nader Hanna, captain of CANADA HANNA team wrote about one of the boards of round nine of the Qualification Swisss:

Board #165 presented a challenging trump suit combination to play in small slam (AK8xxx opposite Jx for no losers!).

(I have written about it in article about ARGENTINA team – Argentinians were one of very few (exactly 3!) pairs who landed in a good diamond slam instead of a poor heart one. - Editor)

I see that on 8 occasions 6♥ was made. The question is how many times the contract was made when the opponents scored the club Ace (i.e., how many times declarer had to find the correct play in the trump suit to make his contract)? At some tables LHO ducked when declarer played a club towards the Q, so the club loser went away when declarer discarded the ♣K on the ♠A, and declarer could afford to play the trump suit for one loser..

At my table (#6), I received the ace of clubs lead, so I had to play the trump suit for no losers. I played the ♥J from dummy (hoping for the actual layout) and it did not matter whether South covered or not.

MISSED OPPORTUNITY

Daniel Savin from Romania reported the hand from Round 2 of 3rd Place Swiss:

I was sitting South and missed the opportunity to put the 10 of Spades and to force declarer to find the correct position on Spades. He is not able to ruff two spades and the remaining heart in the hand so he has to guess the spades.

Unfortunately, while at the table I didn't come up with this very nice defense, I covered, and declarer guessed the split of spades.

HOW TO OPEN OR DOWNLOAD BBO FILE OF THE MATCH

In 2021 BBO files of the matches were easily accessible directly from the website of the tournament. Now BBO works only through browsers, not in the client/server mode and it is slightly more difficult.

We received some questions from tournament participants how they could find BBO files (*.lin) of the matches. It is possible, I dare say even quite simple. Here is step by step instruction:
