## WAS HAMLET WRONG ?

If you scour the works of Shakespeare you will discover there are many references that might be attributed to bridge. One of the most obvious is this from his classic about the Prince of Denmark, *'the play's the thing Wherein I'll catch the conscience of the King'*. Mentioning the Prince of Denmark I am currently editing a book about card play by the Blakset bothers that first appeared in Danish – in his Foreword Dennis Bilde writes *'It is true that bidding is the single most important element in bridge, but it is just as true, that ending up in the right contract doesn't help a lot, if you don't know how to play the cards properly!'* Watching the Round 4 match between Poland Markowicz and McGill I wanted to see if the Bard was right – was the play more important than the bidding?

East led the ♣7 and West put in the nine, declarer winning with the king and playing two rounds of spades. East won and continued with the ♣4, ducked to declarer's jack. Declarer cashed three spades, discarding two diamonds and a heart while East parted with three diamonds and West the ♦3. He then played a diamond. East took it with the ace and played a club allowing West to cash the setting tricks, -100.

Perhaps declarer had forgotten that East's play in clubs guaranteed a third card in the suit?

East led the ♥2 and declarer took West's queen with the king and played two rounds of spades, East winning and switching to the ♣8. Declarer was allowed to win that and he played a diamond to the king and a second club. When West ducked declarer could win and cash his spades. The last of these saw East down to ♥1098 ♦A ♣4 and when he threw the club declarer could play a diamond for 11 tricks, +660 and 13 IMPs.

West led the ♥2 and when declarer played dummy's jack East withheld the ace so declarer could pitch his diamond and was already assured of ten tricks, +420.

If East plays the ♥A declarer ruffs, draws trumps and plays a diamond. West takes the ace and has to switch to clubs. The jack is ducked to declarer's king but then a club to the queen leaves East without resource.

West led the ♠5 and declarer won with the nine and drew trumps before playing a diamond. West took the ace and switched to the ♣J. Declarer put up dummy's queen and East won and played the ♥A. Declarer ruffed and exited with the ♣7, East winning with the eight and returning the two. When declarer put up the king, the downside of playing dummy's queen on the first round of the suit was revealed and the contract failed, at a cost of 10 IMPs.

An alternative line is for declarer to withhold the ♣K on the first round of the suit. If West plays a second club it is clear that declarer will score two tricks he needs, so a heart for the jack and ace ruffed is best. Here too declarer will need to guess clubs at the end.

To defeat 4♠ West must lead the ♦A(!) and then switch to the ♣J. Say declarer wins with the king and after drawing trumps plays a club to the queen and ace. Now East can play the ♥A and must score another club.

4♠ failed five times, twice when North was declarer and East led a diamond at trick one, West switching to a trump. Needing two tricks from the club suit both declarers started with a low card to the queen and went down. I have a feeling that ducking the first round of clubs is best – it wins against a 3-3 break, a doubleton honour with West and some other minor possibilities.

West led the ♠7 and declarer won with the ace and played three rounds of diamonds, West winning and returning the ♥Q. Declarer won in dummy and ran the ♠9, West winning with the jack and playing the ♥9. East won and exited with a heart, but declarer only had a club to lose, +110.

East led the ♣4 and West took the ace and returned the jack, covered by the queen and king. When East continued with a club declarer won and played a diamond to the jack, claiming the rest when it lost, +430 and 8 IMPs.

The winning defence is for East to withhold the ♣K – how he is supposed to work that out is beyond me, so full marks to Belgium's Jean Pierre Lafourcade, who found it.

Six defenders holding West's cards who saw partner lead a club against 3NT put in the jack, no doubt deciding that partner's clubs were unlikely to be headed by the ♣K109.



When I gave the problem to ‘the man on the Clapham omnibus’ he immediately said ‘Isn’t this one of those positions where you put in the jack of clubs?’ Not a bad way for him to celebrate his birthday!

At the mid-way point Markowicz led 22-16.

West led the ♠ 10 and declarer ducked East’s queen, won the next spade and ran the ♦ 10. West had followed with the six which was either a singleton or from ♦ 632 (upside-down count), so East’s decision to duck was surprising. It allowed declarer to cash out for +400.

Had East taken the ♦ Q would have found the essential switch to a low heart for four down?

At one table Argentina’s Hector Camberos, having seen North bid 2♠ as at this table led the ♣ 8. Now declarer could not untangle his winners and ended up overtaking the ♦ 10 with jack and finishing three down.

East led the ♠ J and declarer won with the king, unblocked the ♣ A, crossed to the ♠ A and cashed two clubs pitching a spade and a heart. East ruffed the next club and calmly played a spade, two down, -100.

As far as I can see declarer’s only chance after a spade lead is to find West with a doubleton ♦ K, taking the finesse after pitching a spade on a club – not that it would have helped here.

North led the ♦4 and South won with the ace and switched to the ♣10, followed by the six. North took

the king with the ace and forced dummy with a spade. Declarer ruffed with the ace and cashed all his hearts. North pitched a couple of clubs, but it was clear his shape was 5-1-3-4, +420.

If North could be sure that South's 3♣ implied some support for spades he would surely have bid 4♠ unless he was put off by the vulnerability.

At the risk of boring our undoubtedly erudite readers I will remind you of Meckstroth's Law which states that if partner freely raises your six-card major you should bid game. However, West must have been worried that NS might advance to 4♠. Were that to happen, knowing of the double fit one could always take the save in 5♥.

East led the ♦2 and declarer won with dummy's ace and advanced the ♠10. When it held he continued with a spade to the ace, recording +170 for an 11 IMP swing.

Personally I would like to be able to bid 3♦ with South's hand as a fit non-jump.

I'd also like to be able to bid 2♣ with East's hand in the same vein.

Eight pairs did advance to 5♥, two scoring +750, one +650, one +480, one +450 and one +420. Not a bad save!

Poland Markowicz took the second half 23-19 to record a 45-35, 12.53-7.47 VP win.

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## ART OF DEFENSE

Please, test yourself in two defensive problems.

FIRST:

You are sitting North with:

Both your long suits does not look encouraging – the highest club spot in your hand is six, so establishing extra trick in this suit is rather impossible. ♥9 and ♥7 look better, but in this suit declarer has five cards, so even if you get some extra trick, the same – fifth card will be for the declarer.

Consequently, the choice is restricted to the short suits. Usually, unbid suit is a good lead, but here partner has about 8 HCP so it is hard to imagine diamonds strong enough to establish. And the entries – with your dubleton partner needs usually two – one – to establish the suit (it looks like 3-3 in opponents' hands, second – to cash the tricks.

And what about the spades? It looks like partner has some of them, four, sometimes five. Your king can

help in cooperation to establish spade tricks. Therefore suit is more promising than diamonds.

This way we tackled the first step of problem. Now time for second. Which card of the suit?

Do you remember famous hand of the TSC patron Julian Klukowski from 1976 Olympiad? I will remind:

He was on the lead after the bidding:

He led a spade, but the king!

North had J542 in spades, South a bare queen. Five spades were cashed at the start, and it was the only way to set the contract.

Here, like at the board of Klukowski, declarer usually is short in spades, in which case lead of the king looks very well. Sometimes it may work even if declarer has 2524 shape.

Reiner Marsal at GERMANY 1 - SCOTLAND WHITE match led SPADE KING! Continued with ♠4. South won dummy's nine with the jack, cashed ace of hearts and continued with a heart. Declarer finessed with the ten. Marsal was in hand with the queen and played spade deuce. This way defenders got first six tricks for down one.

It was the only case where West was reduced to only 7 tricks at no trump. There were 7 more no trump contracts from West hand. Bidding was similar and only one more North player led a spade, but that time a low one.

No problem? Third hand high and cry, as we say in Poland?

With ♣AQx queen is the „standard procedure”. But with ace-jack it is less usual. However, after a moment of thought...

In practice it is not possible for declarer to make the contract without diamond tricks, so you keep things under control. In this situation you should make every possible effort to ensure club tricks. Playing the jack in

trick one practically does that job in case declarer has any combination of 4 club cards with king or queen and one high spot - 9 or 10. If declarer has Q109x you can do nothing, as winning the ace and switching to a heart is against the odds.

Six defenders holding West's cards who saw partner lead a club against 3NT put in the jack, no doubt deciding that partner's clubs were unlikely to be headed by the ♣K109. It was a winning line, as the whole board was:

When the ace was played at trick 1 and at rrick 2 ♣J was played and covered by the queen, there was still a winning defence – East should withhold the ♣K – how he is supposed to work that out is beyond me, so full marks to Belgium's Jean Pierre Lafourcade, who found it.

# HOW TO OPEN OR DOWNLOAD BBO FILE OF THE MATCH

In 2021 BBO files of the matches were easily accessible directly from the website of the tournament. Now BBO works only through browsers, not in the client/server mode and it is slightly more difficult.

We received some questions from tournament participants how they could find BBO files (\*.lin) of the matches. It is possible, I dare say even quite simple. Here is step by step instruction:

1. Website of the tournament
