After a consultation with Marek, in Round 7 I followed the match between Germany 2 and England Pryor. Both teams had won four matches and England was looking for a hat-trick of victories to continue their rise up the table.

Having overcalled on the first round West had to choose between a double and 3♣ on the next round. 5♣ needed good breaks in the black suits and North's double was an indication that was not going to happen.

North led the ♦7 and South won with the king and continued with the ace (in theory a heart is best), declarer ruffing. At this point declarer can escape for one down by cashing the ♣A and continuing with the ♣9. If North withholds the king declarer wins in dummy, ruffs a diamond and can afford to lay down the ♥A. North will score two trumps but declarer takes the rest.

Declarer preferred to cross to dummy with the ♠K and played a club for the jack and king. He ruffed the diamond return, cashed the ♣A and then played spades, ruffing the fourth round and playing a heart to the ace. North ruffed and played a spade and that meant three down, -500.

Having cashed the ♠AQ declarer should play on hearts, which saves a trick.

I would be tempted to double 4♠, but I do have the advantage of being able to see all four hands. North led the ♠10 and declarer won with the queen, went to dummy with the ♠K and played a club for the jack and king. North switched to the ♦6 and South won with the king and continued with the ace, declarer ruffing and playing the ♣A. He continued with a club to the queen and ran the ♥10, North ruffing, cashing the ♣10 and playing a diamond at which point declarer claimed 7 tricks, -150 but an 8 IMP gain.

Three pairs were doubled in 4♠, while one EW pair reached 6♣ (undoubled).

Stopping short of slam meant 7 IMPs were lost.

The 3-3 break meant the contract was secure and declarer could try for the black suit squeeze for a possible overtrick, +920 and another 12 IMPs for Germany who held a commanding lead, 49-9.

27 pairs bid a slam on this deal, 13 of them going down.

I think by now everyone knows the mercurial style of David Kendrick. Here he went for a pressurising overcall rather than say a scientific 4♦ (diamonds and a major). The problem with that was that he felt compelled to show his spades next time around.

South led the ♣A and switched to the ♦5 which ensured three down, -800.

The objection to opening 2♦ (or 2♥) is that partner

tends not to play you for such a good suit, even though it may be theoretically possible.

Being a level lower meant -500 and a gain of 7 IMPs.

9 pairs bid a slam with the NS cards and a couple of EW pairs sacrificed in 7♦. One declarer in 6♥ saw the defenders start with two rounds of diamonds and decided to ruff with the ♥J. Unlucky.

Germany 2 were convincing winners, 72-16, 19.17-0.83 VP. It moved them up to third and pushed England Pryor down to 15th.

WHEN YOU UNDERLEAD AN ACE

Funny things happen when you underlead an Ace. Look at the example from round six.

With no obvious leads I decided for the ♦7. King won the trick, South played ♦4 (upside-down).

At trick 2 ♣Q was played and South won with the

king. He continued with ♥6, won in hand by the eight. Spade to the ace was played and a small spade ruffed in hand. Now club, ruffed with ♥3. Spade ruffed with the king (North disposing ♦10). Club ruffed with the jack (South discarding a spade) and spade jack – covered with the king and ruffed with the trump ace (club from North).

This is the ending:

Declarer played a diamond. North won with the ace and played a club. Declarer was left with no response and the „10 easy tricks” looking contract was set down one.

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LEAVE THE SLAMS TO THE OPPONENTS – ctd.

Marek Wójcicki

Yesterday in the first part of the article I recalled Polish adage from the times of „Polish scoring” with origin at Plafon. It was „*Niech szlemiki licytują przeciwniki*” – in free translation – „Let the opponents bid slams”. I have shown a few boards from round VI with substantial swings created by the slam bidding.

When I was watching round VII, there were also two with similar outcomes.

Total swing was 175 imps in 18 matches... The range of contracts was very wide - from 7NT made (lead was ♠J) and 7♠ made twice, to 4♥ and 3NT. Most popular were 6♥ (6) and 6♠ (also 6).

I have no idea what the correct bidding should have been here. I can easily imagine North/South players with their powerful hands, showing their extralengths and ending in something like 7 No Chances. Here is the example from one of the tables:

First four rounds look like some kind of more or less natural bidding with players showing their suits after artificial 2♣, but in fact it was quite a bit of system:

2♣ – weak two in diamonds or any game forcing

- 2♦ – pass/correct
- 2♥ – any game forcing
- 2♠ – relay
- 3♣ – hearts and another suit
- 3♦ – relay
- 3♠ – second suit is clubs
- 4♦ – natural

Interesting was the contract of 6♦. One of the declarers – Jaak Simm from Estonia – made it with a little help of friendly opponent, but his line opened up the chances to make 12 tricks.

The bidding was:

Declarer cashed spade ace and queen, and played a club. East did not try to make any use of his trump eight nor ten... In 4-card ending, having in hand ♠K ♦AKJ he exited with the spade... Poor West was left with Q932 of trumps and had to ruff and lead a diamond to the tenace in hand...

If East's trumps were 632, that line would be a winner without chance for the defenders.



Another board of this round looks like a simple grand slam, with both hands rather strong (33 HCP in combined hands, 5-5 trumps, good shortness):

I do not remember who, but somebody said: „There are not flat grand slam boards”. Here at 14 tables North-South pairs did not bid a grand, but stopped rather safely at 6♥.

There are various agreements, but most pairs used here some variation of Jacoby 2NT after South’s opening of 1♥. Using classic version, continuation should be easy, for example:

When South showed 15+HCP and short diamonds, chances for ♠Q or ♣AJxx were very good and Bizoń decided to bid a grand slam.

At one table it became obvious, that it is better to have agreements on how to show key cards when opponents interfere, as the bidding was:

HOW TO OPEN OR DOWNLOAD BBO FILE OF THE MATCH

In 2021 BBO files of the matches were easily accessible directly from the website of the tournament. Now BBO works only through browsers, not in the client/server mode and it is slightly more difficult.

We received some questions from tournament participants how they could find BBO files (*.lin) of the matches. It is possible, I dare say even quite simple. Here is step by step instruction:

1. Website of the tournament
