In this year's opening round my main focus is on Canada Murray v USA Lusky.



North led the \triangle A and when South followed with the two, he switched to the \lozenge J, declarer taking the queen and cashing the ace. When North pitched a heart he tried a heart, covering North's jack with dummy's queen, but South won and surprisingly played back the \heartsuit 4 rather than the \triangle 10. Declarer won and ran the \triangle J. When that lost South returned the \triangle 10 and that meant three down, -300.



I wondered if East would consider doubling for a second time, but would it be clear that was takeout orientated?

West led the ♦K and switched to the ♣5, the defenders cashing three tricks in the suit after which West forced dummy with the ♦Q. Declarer played two rounds of hearts and East won and played another diamond. Declarer ruffed in dummy, ruffed a heart and naturally played a spade, but that meant he was three down, -150, and 10 IMPs went to the Canadians.

No less than 18 pairs attempted 3NT – only one of them took nine tricks.

West led the \clubsuit J and declarer took the ace and ran the \spadesuit J, East winning and switching to the \diamondsuit J. Declarer won with dummy's ace and played a heart, East winning as West pitched the \clubsuit 4. Declarer took the diamond return with the king and played the \heartsuit Q, East winning and playing back a club. Declarer ruffed, cashed the \heartsuit 10 and then played a spade to the ace, claiming the rest when the king did not appear, one down and -200.

If declarer had played out all his trumps West would have been in trouble. Forced to keep three spades he would have to pitch a diamond and then declarer could take a spade finesse and throw West in with a diamond to bring dummy back to life.


To avoid this possible outcome, East must exit with a spade rather than a club.

Declarer won the club lead and played the ♥ J, East winning and switching to the ♦ J. Declarer took the king and played a spade to the eight, East winning and switching to the ♣9. Declarer ruffed and played the ♥10 and East won and now needed to play a second diamond. When he played a spade, declarer won with the jack and played his remaining trumps, squeezing West. That meant +620 and 13 IMPs.



West led the $\Diamond Q$ and continued the suit, declarer ruffing, playing a club to the ace, overtaking the $\bigstar K$, cashing the $\bigstar K$, the $\bigstar Q$, the $\bigstar Q$ and the $\bigstar J$. Now the winning line is to play a black card. West can ruff with the $\heartsuit 8$ but declarer overruffs in dummy and plays a heart for the ten, king and ace. When West exits with the $\heartsuit 3$ playing the $\heartsuit 4$ results in 10 tricks.

Not easy to see, but if West cashes the $\heartsuit A$ at trick two and only then plays a second diamond (or a low heart) declarer can only score nine tricks. It meant a swing of 10 IMPs

Canada Murray had edged it 26-24 to start with a win, 10.77-9.23.



The most popular contracts were 400 (sometimes doubled) and 5. (usually doubled). Let's focus on the former one. The heart game was played 8 times and exactly half of the declarers succeeded. In one case, East played a spade early solving declarer's problems. In the second, West discarded a spade prematurely, not giving his partner the possibility of finding an appropriate defence. The other two declarers, Ron Gerard for USA Lusky and Eduard Velecky for Slovakia, made a heart game with spade-diamond squeeze.

Velecky ruffed the club, played a trump to East's ace, took diamond continuation with dummy's ace and executed the squeeze, cashing the rest of the trumps. When West discarded a spade in the 11th trick, Velecky proceeded with the spade finesse to take all the last 3 tricks of the suit.

To set the contract, East had to refrain from continuing clubs. Instead, when in hand twice with \heartsuit AK and once with \spadesuit Q, he should have played two times diamonds and one spade to destroy declarer's communications.
