West led the $\Diamond K$, won the second trick with the $\bigstar K$ and switched to the $\bigstar 4$. Declarer went up with dummy's ace, played a spade to the jack and advanced the $\heartsuit 10$, putting up dummy' king and claiming on the next round of the suit, +980.

Only an initial club lead will defeat 64.





South led the $\heartsuit A$ and declarer ruffed, cashed the $\diamondsuit KQ$, went to dummy with a club and ran the $\clubsuit J$ to South's ace. Declarer could ruff the heart return, cross to dummy with a club to draw the outstanding trump and claim, +1370 and 12 IMPs, reducing England's margin to 22-12.

In Round 4 we return to the top of table for Canada West +I against Belgium.

Although that was something of a triumph, to my untrained eye $4 \spadesuit$ (or even $5 \diamondsuit$) are better spots. I5 pairs bid $4 \spadesuit$.



West led the ♠6 and having won perforce with dummy's ace, declarer played a club to the queen and claimed, +920.





When he continued with the $\triangle A$ followed by the queen North won and played the $\Diamond Q$ and declarer ruffed, cashed the $\triangle J$ and ran the $\triangle J$. South won and played the $\heartsuit J$ and that was three down, -300.

 $4 \triangleq$ can be made – after disposing of a diamond declarer plays two rounds of clubs, subsequently losing only two trump tricks.

7 pairs played in 4♠, only Waclaw Wejknis making it for Poland Andrzejki by following the winning line – it proved to be worth 14 IMPs when the same contract went three down in the other room.
