Declarer won with dummy's ace, played a club to the ace, ruffed a club high, played a heart to the jack, ruffed a club high and drew the outstanding trump. A spade to dummy's ace was followed by a spade to the nine for a well-played +980.

It's not often that you have six-card support for a suit partner overcalls in.

Here South led the ♦A and switched to the ♣Q so declarer could win, ruff a club and then draw trumps while ruffing two more clubs. He could now be certain that South held at most one spade so he cashed the ♠A and then took the marked finesse for a push.

6 pairs were allowed to play in 6♥ – this was the only match where both sides managed it.

Should South have advanced to 5♠? He knew partner would have decent trumps and at most two hearts, but would he be able to cover the potential club losers?

Another possibility is to double 5♥. Were partner to find a diamond lead (yes, its hardly likely) the defenders can, in theory, collect the first six tricks.

Here North led the ♠2 and declarer ruffed in dummy, played a heart to the ace, ruffed a spade and played a heart to the jack for an effortless +480 and 15 IMPs.

Something similar happened in the match between Poland 2 and South Africa but virtually everywhere else NS were allowed to play in 4♠. The exception was in the match between Latvia and Germany I. In the Open Room Latvia had collected +450 in 4♠.

South led the ♠A and declarer ruffed and played a diamond to the queen, getting the bad news. He cashed the ♦J and the ♥A, came to hand with a diamond, took the heart finesse and played a club. When North followed with the four South won with the king and fatally returned a club rather than forcing declarer with a spade. That meant declarer had 11 tricks and 13 IMPs.

Let's move on to Round 6.

When North played the ♦A declarer ruffed and played the ♠K. North won and exited with the jack, but declarer won and played a heart and North had to ruff and give the game going trick to dummy's ♦K, +790 and 13 IMPs.

Instead of the ♦A North needs to exit with the ♠J (or even the ♠8).

After two rounds of diamonds West switched to the ♥J, but it made no difference, declarer playing to eliminate the red suits while drawing trumps before playing two rounds of clubs for the same endplay, +790 and 13 IMPs.

I'll conclude with a straightforward looking deal – alas, at the bridge table not many fall into that category:

If North leads a diamond South takes the ace and continues with the queen, forcing declarer to ruff. A club to the ten and ace is followed by another diamond, declarer ruffing with the ♠9. When declarer cashes the ♠A South discards the ♣3 and now declarer unblocks the ♥KJ crosses to dummy with a club and cashes the ♥A to reach this ending:
