East led the ♦Q and declarer won with dummy's ace and played three rounds of hearts, overruffing West's ♠9 with the ten, playing a spade to the ace and ruffing a heart. Three rounds of clubs, ruffing in dummy allowed declarer to pitch a diamond on the established heart for +1430.

Have you discussed this situation with your partner? In principle if South does not have a major a rebid of 2♦ is in order. If South had five good clubs a redouble would suggest playing there, but does the pass show exactly four clubs? Clearly NS had differing opinions.

East led the ♠A and switched to the ♣3, West winning with the queen and playing two rounds of

spades. East won and exited with a club and declarer won with the nine, crossed to dummy with a diamond and played the ♠Q. East won, cashed another heart and exited with a spade, declarer ruffing, cashing the ♣A and exiting with the ♦K. East ruffed and at the end declarer scored a trick with the ♠J, three down, -1000 and 14 IMPs away.

If East switches to a diamond at trick two, then four down is possible as East will be able to score two diamond ruffs.

North led the ♠8 and declarer won, ruffed a diamond, cashed the ♥A, ruffed a heart, ruffed a diamond, ruffed a heart and drew trumps. The ♦AK took care of dummy's remaining small clubs and the ♣A was the entry to the winning hearts, +1510 and another 11 IMPs.

Another pair reached 7♠, but after a trump lead declarer relied on the club finesse.

West led the ♥3 and East took dummy's ten with the jack and switched to the ♣Q, continuing with the ace when it held and then playing the ♣6, declarer winning and discarding the ♠2 from dummy. Declarer now cashed his diamonds and then played two rounds

of spades, but East could win and cash another spade and a club for two down, -500 and 12 IMPs for Lithuania who had won 53-2 to secure a rare maximum.

Having taken two diamonds declarer must take the heart finesse, cash the ♥A, take two diamonds ending in hand and exit with a club to endplay East.

Round 8 was not the most exciting, but there were still points of interest.

A number of players opened 5♣, but no one else raised. At the contrary, one East/West pair stopped in partial – East opened 2♣ Precision style and after 2♦ has rebid 3♣ – minimum with 6+♣, and when East took conservative view on the board, it became a final contract.

Almost everyone reached 3NT on this deal.

Where South led a heart declarer won performe in dummy, crossed to dummy with a club and when South pitched a diamond they played the ♦8 to dummy's jack and came to at least nine tricks.

Vytatutas Vainikonis played dummy's king which looks eminently reasonable but didn't work here.

Notice that if South holds on to all five diamonds declarer can only get home by running the ♦!! If South covers with the nine, declarer plays dummy's jack, wins the second round of diamonds by beating South's queen and the suit is blocked.

low club went to the eight, nine and jack. Declarer won the heart return with the ace, ducked a club to East's ace, ruffed the diamond return and played a club, +790.

Once West pitches a club, declarer can secure an overtrick by playing dummy's $\diamond J$, covered and ruffed. He then plays the $\clubsuit 10$ and runs it. However, this would cost the contract if East's clubs were $\clubsuit AJ$.

West led the $\heartsuit 10$ and declarer won with the ace pitching a club from dummy. A diamond saw West ruff and switch to the $\clubsuit 5$, East winning and returning the $\diamond 9$. West ruffed, cashed the $\clubsuit K$ and continued with the five, allowing East to score the $\spadesuit J$ for two down, -200 and 14 IMPs.

West led the $\clubsuit 5$ and East won with the ace and returned the eight. He ruffed the $\clubsuit 3$ and played the $\diamond 3$, West ruffing and playing the $\clubsuit J$. When declarer ruffed (discarding saves a trick) East overruffed and exited with a diamond and that was three down, -300.

West led the $\heartsuit 9$ and declarer ruffed in dummy and played the $\clubsuit 4$. When East followed with the eight the ten lost to the jack. It was not easy for West to appreciate that a club return was essential and when he exited with a spade declarer won, drew trumps and played on clubs for +620 and 14 IMPs.

In the match between Poland PKB and Poland 2, Zdzislaw Swiatek found the low club lead against $4♠$ after his partner, Jacek Lesniczak had opened 1♦. East won and switched to the $\diamond 3$ for two down.

In the replay $4♠$ was made, declarer ruffing the heart lead in dummy, and attempting to cash the $\diamond A$. West ruffed and continued with a heart and declarer ruffed in dummy and drew trumps. He then ran the $\clubsuit 10$ and emerged with 10 tricks and 13 IMPs.

The key point is that on the second round of hearts East must unblock an honour. Then when declarer runs the $\clubsuit 10$ East must duck it!

If East does not unblock in hearts declarer can run the $\clubsuit 10$ as before. If East ducks declarer cashes the $\heartsuit A$ and exits with a club. If East plays a heart declarer pitches a club and East has to lead into dummy's diamonds.

The Only One

Artur Wasiak

Kazimierz Omernik is a Polish player in his late seventies, whose most important international results are gold medal from European Senior Pairs in Menton (2003) and silver medal from European Senior Teams in Malmo (2004). In Poland he is well-known for making some unusual bidding decisions from time to time.

You could see an example of such a decision in the penultimate board of round 7.

Omernik was the only player in the whole field who decided to open 1NT with the East hand. His partner, Waław Wejknis, transferred to diamonds, and then bid 3NT, which probably showed mild slam invitation. With a supermaximum of 1NT opening range Omernik continued bidding despite having only 2-card support. A moment later he became a declarer of 6♦.

With this distribution of North-South cards playing from East hand gave him a big advantage. Not only South could not establish a club winner for his side, but his heart lead made it clear that

both honours of that suit are in the North's hand.

In the first trick Omernik took North's ♥J with the ace. Then he played ♦Q and another diamond to the king, discovering the bad news. One more top diamond followed. North discarded two small spades, East – also a spade. In the 5th trick declarer finessed the heart and next he cashed the ♥K.

South didn't ruff the ♥K, pitching a club. The simplest line would be to discard a club from dummy and rely on the spade finesse. Instead of playing this way, Omernik discarded a spade, ruffed the fourth heart and endplayed his LHO with the ♦ in this ending, discarding a spade from his hand:

When South exited with a small club, declarer played a low card from dummy and won this trick with his ♣Q. He had the heart winner to discard one more spade, thus his play resulted in 12 tricks.

17 West-East pairs went minus in this board, 10 won the games and this table was the only one to score the slam bonus. Omernik earned 17 IMPs for his team, Poland Andrzejki.

Team POLAND PKB was allowed to register as there were 27 teams registered at the entries deadline.
