I cannot be certain of the meaning of the North's 3♦ as the section on the Convention Card describing action over opponent's takeout double is blank. How a rebid of 4♣ by South would have been interpreted we will never know.

East led the ♣9 and declarer won with dummy's ace and played the ♥7, West winning with the king as East followed with the two. After due consideration West returned the ♣10 and East's ruff ensured one down via the ♦K, -50.

South led the ♦A and when North followed with the jack he switched to the ♣7, North playing the jack (would you have found the defence of continuing with a low diamond – even then after ruffing North needs to return a low club). If declarer ducks this the defenders are helpless, but that requires North's diamond to be a singleton. After taking the ♣A declarer cashed the top spades, but when the queen refused to appear all hope had gone and the contract was inevitably two down, -200 and 3 IMPs to Poland who took the set 18-12 (which in some circles is described as an overture).

North led the ♠5 and declarer took dummy's ace, South following with the queen (would it be better to play the king?). Three rounds of diamonds (declarer pitching a club and a heart) saw North duck the queen, take the jack and then fatally switch to the ♥10. However, when declarer did not rise with dummy's ace the defenders were still in with a shout as South took the king. Cashing the ♠K now will still leave declarer with only eight tricks, but South returned the ♣10 and declarer won with dummy's king and cleared the diamonds, ensuring nine tricks, +400.

A club to the ace and a club meant +980 and 11 IMPs, Austria's only points of the set.

## After Lightner Double

Jakub Wojcieszek

Watching Transatlantic Seniors Cup I spotted a quite interesting board, where Piotr Bizoń from Poland I team had to find first lead after Lightner double.

The bidding was (WE vulnerable):

What should be led from West cards:

♠ 76 ♥ 42 ♦ Q8752 ♣ KJ108 ?

It is obvious that the partner has a minor void and an ace. While broadcasting this board I thought that diamond void is more probable than club. However Piotr chose a club lead, hence I decided to make a simulation of the frequency of partner's club vs. diamond void.

Assuming:

1) South has 5+ diamonds 4 hearts 2+spades (no 3♠ cue from S)

2) North has 5+ clubs (2♣ is natural in most of cases; I am not sure why milaszewski decided to bid it in that board) and 4 hearts

3) North + South high card points count is 28+

4) East has A of spades and void in clubs or diamonds.

Checking:

The Dealer program could find 576 such boards (generating  $10^9$ ) and void in diamonds was in 93,5% and in clubs in 6,5% which is rather surprising outcome

How to play this grand slam after spade lead? The obvious simple line of play – chosen by the German declarer in one of the other matches – is to draw trumps and take the club finesse. Maybe you can do better?

Wojciech Olański ruffed a diamond, took ♥A and continued with three more ruffs: heart, diamond, heart. Then he drew trumps and had all the tricks without having to rely on the finesse. He took 7 spades, ♥AK and one more heart trick from the length, ♦AK and ♣A.

How to estimate the chance of this line? To be successful, you need the spades to be 3-2. Then either favourable break of the hearts will give you the 13th trick, or you'll take your plan B of the club finesse.

The simple line gains when ♣K is with North and spades break 4-1.

What about the probabilities? The chance for spades 3-2 is a bit over 70% (after the first trick we can exclude 5-0). Hearts break 4-3 in over 60% of the cases and the club finesse gives you the half of the rest. So you need two conditions with chances over 70% and over 80%. Without detailed calculations and without specifying what „over” 70 or 80 means) I would estimate the overall results as nearly 60% chance. For sure it's more than the finesse.

Finally, does the first lead have any impact on the chances? Most of the defenders could think about the club lead when they don't have ♣K. On the other hand, some cunning players would lead a club when they do have the king (knowing from 4♣ cue bid that ♣A is in dummy). Nothing sure in this topic. The next question: can we deduce anything about spades from the trump lead? Probably North wouldn't choose this suit with a singleton but could lead from 4 small spades. For that reason you might assume that the chance for 3-2 break is higher than the number you can take from some well-known table of probabilities.
