East led the ♣K and declarer took dummy's ace and played the ♠9, running it when West followed with the ♠2. A second spade saw West take the king and exit with the ♠7 to dummy's ace. Declarer cashed the top diamonds disposing of a heart, ruffed a diamond, cashed the ♠Q and played a club to dummy's ten, a heart and a spade getting her up to 10 tricks, +590.

I can hear what you are thinking – a low club lead is better.

my's ♠A and played a spade to the queen but when East discarded he could not avoid the loss of two spades and a heart for -50 and a 12 IMP loss.

Suppose declarer plays a low spade to the queen at trick two, disclosing the 4-0 split.

Now it is safe to play a spade to the ace, cash two diamonds discarding a club and then exit with a spade. West wins and exits with a spade and declarer wins, cashes another spade discarding the ♣10 reaching this position:

When South could only win with the ♦A and return the ♦2 declarer took North's ♦Q in dummy and played a diamond. South could ruff, but that was the last trick for the defence, +420.

9 pairs bid 5♥ with the NS cards, three of them being allowed to play undoubled.

Denmark had recorded 34 unanswered IMPs to win 34-14, 15.26-4.74 VP.

TROJAN HORSE

In the penultimate board of the first round most of the field played heart partscores (successfully) and heart games (unsuccessfully). However, I found an interesting theme in the contract of 4♦ bid by the other pair. This contract happened only at two tables, so I will give you both bidding sequences.

Both South players selected the ♣Q lead. Declarers won with dummy's ♣A and ruffed a club in hand. Let's analyse the situation from double-dummy perspective.

If South overruffs with their ♦J, the defense will have to choose one of the ways to concede 10 tricks to declarer. If they don't play diamonds, East will ruff all the three major suit losers in dummy. On the other hand, playing trumps will give enough entries to dummy to establish and run the clubs (provided that declarer won't ruff with the smallest trumps but that is quite easy).

In fact, one of the declarers could make 4♦ this way but in the 5-card ending...

... he ruffed a heart in dummy while he needed to ruff a spade first.

The possibility of taking the second trick with the ♦J is an example of the Trojan horse. To set the contract, South must refuse this gift. Later in the play North will win with his ♠K and the trump play from his side will be the winning move. (Some interesting things may happen in the meantime, including the necessity of refusing the club overruff once again).

Finding this defense is not obvious even knowing the whole distribution. If one of the players played this way single-dummy, it would have been a real masterpiece.

BE CAREFUL WHEN CLAIMING

BBO gives players a special way of treating contested claims. If the claim is denied the play continues. I will treat such decision accordingly to the Law 68D2b - and "the score subsequently obtained will stand".

Alternatively players can call the director who will start a procedure you know very well from "live" matches.
