

Given that North did not bid 2\$, the raise to 3\$ clearly suggested a modest hand (some pairs play that a redouble in this situation promises a high honour in partner's suit) so hoping for 11 tricks was possibly a little optimistic.

West led the $\clubsuit 9$ and East took the ace and returned the $\spadesuit 10$, West ruffing and playing the $\heartsuit 3$. East won with the $\heartsuit A$ and played the $\spadesuit 6$ and declarer discarded a club, West's ruff putting the contract two down, -100.

West reasoned there was little point in leading a spade. He went with a club, but somewhat unluckily selected the ♣5. Declarer won with dummy's ♣10, cashed four diamonds and having seen West pitch two hearts played the ♠K. East won and returned a club so declarer had 11 tricks, +460 and 13 IMPs.



West led the $\clubsuit 5$ and declarer cashed all his diamonds before playing the $\spadesuit 2$ to dummy's by now singleton queen. East won, cashed the $\heartsuit A$ and played a club, so declarer took 10 tricks, +430 and an IMP.

Ulrich Kratz and Loek Fresen were the only pair to defeat 3NT after Loek started with a Multi and saw partner bid 2Φ over Eric Rodwell's double. When Doug Simson bid 3NT over Eric's $3\diamondsuit$, Loek led the \heartsuit A and continued with the \heartsuit J, West taking the \heartsuit K and switching to the Φ K when declarer had only eight tricks.

Another approach with West's cards is to bid $3\diamondsuit$ as a fit non jump. Here that would have meant there was less chance of South doubling $4\heartsuit$.

Declarer won the spade lead, played a diamond to the queen, followed by two more rounds of the suit, ruffing. Declarer cashed the \heartsuit KQ and when the suit divided he claimed the rest, +790 and 12 IMPs.



Declarer took the diamond return with dummy's ace and played a club to the jack, North discarding the $\heartsuit 2$. When declarer tried a spade to the jack South won, cashed two diamonds and exited with a club to declarer's $\clubsuit A 10$, the defenders being sute to score another trick for one down.

North led the $\heartsuit 2$ and South won with the $\heartsuit 9$ and returned the $\heartsuit K$, declarer taking dummy's ace (pitching a diamond) running the $\clubsuit Q$ and then playing a club to the jack as North parted with the $\heartsuit 7$. A spade to the jack lost to the queen and South exited with a spade. Declarer won with dummy's king, played a spade to the ace and two rounds of diamonds ending in hand and exited with the $\clubsuit 6$. South could win and cash a diamond, but had to surrender the last two tricks to the $\clubsuit A 10$, +400 and 10 IMPs.

3NT is not an easy contract on this layout. It failed 12 times – and made 12 times.

Without attempting an exhaustive analysis, one thing that struck me was that if North discards a heart on the second round of clubs, declarer could consider ducking a heart. If South wins and plays back the \heartsuit K declarer can win with the \heartsuit A and play a third heart, which would be unpleasant for South. North would win and play a diamond, but declarer ducks, wins the next diamond and plays a heart, establishing a ninth trick.

However, a stronger defence is for South to exit with a diamond, when, although the contract can still be made, declarer is likely to rely on the spade finesse and go down.

TIME TROUBLE

Going into Round 6, the teams in the middle of the table would be hoping to consolidate their positions in the race to qualify for the knock out phase. Meanwhile those at the wrong end of the table were running out of chances to qualify. I decided to check out the form of the teams currently 11th and 14th.

I leave you to judge the merits of doubling with a balanced hand opposite a passed partner at unfavourable vulnerability. As Eric Crowhurst might have written, 'Include me out'.

West led the $\heartsuit 6$ for the eight, queen and ace and declarer played the $\diamondsuit Q$, West winning and returning the $\heartsuit 6$ to dummy's king, East unblocking the $\heartsuit 9$. A spade to the queen saw West win and cash the $\heartsuit J$, but declarer took the rest via the diamond finesse, +430.

West won, cashed the $\diamondsuit A$ and exited with the $\bigstar 6$, East winning and returning the $\heartsuit 2$ which meant three down, -150 and an 11 IMP swing.

West led the $\clubsuit 4$ and declarer won with the $\clubsuit A$ and ran the $\heartsuit 8$ to East's king. He took the spade return with the king, played a heart for the jack and ace and pitched a club on the $\heartsuit 7$ as East discarded the $\diamondsuit 2$. West won and switched to the $\clubsuit Q$, East winning and returning the $\diamondsuit J$. Declarer won, played a spade to dummy's ten and claimed his contract, +420.

West led the $\clubsuit 3$ and declarer took the $\clubsuit A$ and ran the $\heartsuit 9$, East winning and switching to the $\lozenge J$. Declarer won with the $\lozenge A$, played a heart to the ace and ruffed a heart, East pitching the $\lozenge 2$. Declarer cashed the $\lozenge K$ and $\clubsuit K$, ruffed a diamond and played the $\heartsuit 7$, East discarding the $\lozenge 8$. If declarer ruffs this he can then ruff a diamond and play the $\heartsuit 10$ pitching a club, scoring a club at the end. However, he pitched the $\clubsuit 4$ allowing West to win with the $\heartsuit Q$.

If West exits with the $\clubsuit 6$ the defenders will get two more tricks, but according to the BBO record he played the $\clubsuit Q$, East winning with the $\clubsuit A$ and returning the $\lozenge 10$. Declarer ruffed in dummy, and placing the missing trump with East, played the $\heartsuit 10$.

That was one down and a 10 IMP loss.

One can sympathise with declarer, but which was more likely, a misdefence or that East would have falescarded in spades with the \$986?

South led the $\heartsuit 3$ and when dummy's $\heartsuit K$ held declarer ran the $\clubsuit 7$ which held. Now declarer played a diamond to the ace and a diamond for the nine, ten and jack, North exiting with the $\heartsuit 8$ to dummy's jack. Declarer cashed four spades and exited with the $\diamondsuit 8$,

but there was no endplay, one down, -100.


Given the entry position, declarer might have overtaken the $\clubsuit 7$. If the $\clubsuit 8$ holds then playing the $\clubsuit Q$ gives you four tricks in the suit (an 8.07% chance) Once the $\clubsuit 7$ holds crossing to dummy with a spade and playing the $\clubsuit Q$ is the way to go.

When the opponents don't use Blackwood one can hope for an accident, but if they are overboard you already have a great result in the offing.

South led the $\clubsuit Q$, and declarer ruffed in dummy, played a heart to the king, ruffed a club, cashed two hearts pitching a diamond, came to hand with the $\diamondsuit A$, ruffed a club, ruffed a diamond, ruffed a club and played the $\spadesuit Q$, +1660 and 6 IMPs.

17 pairs stopped short of slam, while three were doubled.

Anyone for a blue card?

It was a big win for Belgium, 47-3, 18.87-1.13 VP, taking them up to seventh while Scotland White dropped to twentieth place.



BE CAREFUL WHEN CLAIMING

BBO gives players a special way of treating contested claims. If the claim is denied the play continues. I will treat such decision accordingly to the Law 68D2b - and "the score subsequently obtained will stand".

Alternatively players can call the director who will start a procedure you know very well from "live" matches.
