

Declarer took the \heartsuit A and played a spade to the king, West discard of the \oiint 3 revealing the position. When the diamond finesse lost, declarer was out of ammunition and could only muster eight tricks, -50.

Declarer took the second round of clubs and played the \bigstar J, East winning with the \bigstar Q and switched to

the \diamond 5, West winning with the \diamond K and playing the \clubsuit Q, ruffed and overruffed by East who exited with a diamond. When declarer tried the \diamond J East ruffed and played the \heartsuit 4 and declarer could manage only seven tricks, three down, -500 and 10 IMPs away.

Having taken two rounds of trumps declarer can cash the \clubsuit A, and when South discards there is an easy route to 12 tricks.

North led the \heartsuit 10 and continued with the \heartsuit 2, declarer ruffing and playing the \clubsuit 2. When North followed with the \clubsuit 4 it would have been a big ask to put in the \clubsuit 9 so that was one down, -100 and a 10 IMP loss.



West led the $\heartsuit 5$ and declarer won with the $\heartsuit 9$ and played a diamond for the queen and ace. When East continued with the $\heartsuit 3$ declarer could win with dummy's $\heartsuit 10$, draw trumps and dispose of dummy's spades on the $\heartsuit AKQ$ for +1540 and 17 IMPs.

In my main match, USA Seligman led 33.1-24 at half time. All the matches were close, the biggest lead being that of France Bessis over Poland Olimpia which stood at 25.1 IMPs

In the second half of Poland's match against Argentina Michał Kwiecień performed nice declarer play.



After the spade lead Kwiecień won with the ace, ran \heartsuit 6 and continued with another heart to West's queen and dummy's ace. Then he played &J to West's queen. Carlos Lucena continued with \Diamond 10 to declarer's ace and Michał played a low club towards dummy.



West won with the king and in the following ending:



continued diamonds which proved to be fatal for his side. Kwiecień ruffed this trick and later ruffed two more diamonds, getting to dummy with \$10 and with a club ruff (ruffing his own ace). It made a total of 6 trump tricks and one in each side suit. In the two-card ending West had to ruff his partner's spade winners. 140 for Poland.

Piotr Bizoń chose a one level higher opening bid with East hand. South's decision to bid an off-shape takeout double resulted in a terrible contract with only 5 trumps in combined hands. Compare the trump-taking potential of declarer in this contract with one played by Kwiecień...

The defenders didn't take all the tricks that they could but it was still four down, 200 for Poland and 8 IMPs.

East led the \$8 and declarer took dummy's ace and ran the \Diamond 9, East winning with the \Diamond Q and continuing with the \$5. Declarer ruffed and cashed the AK, East discarding the $\Diamond 2$. When declarer continued with a heart to dummy's queen and a diamond for the ten, jack and king he was sure to be one down, and when he subsequently tried to cash the $\Diamond A$ having ruffed the club return, he was two down as West could ruff, draw the remaining trumps and play a club, -200.

If declarer had relied on a 3-3 break in hearts, he could have cashed the $\Diamond A$ and ruffed a diamond. West could overruff and cash a spade, but declarer would have the rest.

East led the $\Diamond K$ and declarer won and played back the $\diamond 3$ for the five, nine and ten, West switching to the \clubsuit K. Declarer won in dummy, cashed the \bigstar AK, and played the \Diamond J, ruffing when it was covered. West could overruff, but declarer could claim 10 tricks (and could take the last one with the \Diamond 7!) along with 13 IMPs. It was the only double-digit swing in the second half of this match, which the Romanian's took 46-6 to topple the Swedes.

NL Seniors had started the second half trailing Denmark by 13.1, but they picked up 13 here by making 4th in the Closed Room while it was two down in the replay.

In the match between USA Seligman and The Dutch Masters, the Americans appeared to be in control, having taken the score to 48.1-27 with only five deals remaining:

It was the only occasion on which anyone ventured beyond 4♡.





South's initial overcall was fine, his second ran into a hail of bullets.

East started with three rounds of spades and declarer won with the \clubsuit J having unblocked dummy's queen and played the \heartsuit 6, East taking the \heartsuit A and playing the last spade, declarer ruffing and playing a diamond for the king and ace. The die was cast – there was no way to avoid going four down, -800.

West led the \$7 and declarer took dummy's ace and tried a diamond for the king and ace. He ruffed the club continuation and played a diamond. He had no way of knowing it, but he was playing with the house's money. He managed four tricks for three down, -150 but NL Seniors had eliminated the World Champions!

In the match between USA Seligman and The Dutch Masters, the I^{\heartsuit} was two down in the Closed Room.

South led the $\heartsuit K$ and declarer won and played the $\diamond 3$ for the two, ten and nine. A club saw North take the ace and return the $\clubsuit J$, South ruffing, cashing the $\heartsuit Q$, playing a heart for North to ruff, ruffing a club and playing the $\heartsuit 10$, promoting North's $\bigstar J$ for three

down, -150 and 6 IMPs. It was not enough – could someone have doubled? In theory declarer can take nine tricks in spades, but theory and practice are not always in alignment.

Did you notice that EW might make 3NT?

Say South leads the $\heartsuit K$ and declarer wins and takes the diamond finesse. After cashing the $\diamondsuit A$ discarding a heart, declarer plays a club to the king followed by three rounds of spades. South wins and exits with a heart to dummy's jack and now a club ensures another trick in that suit getting declarer up to nine.

Leading a heart honour may appear helpful, but on this layout you can always get up to nine tricks if you do everything right.

Three pairs bid 3NT and although no one played perfectly, the contract made on two occasions.
