

North led the \clubsuit A and when South followed with the \clubsuit 2 he switched to the \heartsuit 10, declarer winning with the \heartsuit A and playing a spade to the nine followed by a diamond to the ace. The next spade was covered by the queen and dummy's king, and North took the next trick with the \pounds A and played the \diamondsuit 10. When declarer put up dummy's queen South took the king and played the \clubsuit J, declarer finishing with seven tricks, two down, -100.

As you can see, the play on both sides was a little nervous.



North led the $\diamond 5$ for the four, king and ace and declarer played a spade to the jack, a heart to the

ace, a spade for the queen and king and cleared the spades. When North exited with the \$8 declarer had 10 tricks, +430 and 11 IMPs.

This was the only match in which 3NT was attempted.

I suspect you don't need me to suggest that $3 \diamondsuit$ was dubious.

West led the \bigstar K and declarer took dummy's ace, played a diamond to the ace and ran the \heartsuit Q, East winning and returning the \bigstar 7. West took two tricks in the suit and exited with a spade, declarer ruffing with dummy's \bigstar 9 and discarding the \diamondsuit 5. When West ruffed the \heartsuit A and exited with the \diamondsuit 7 declarer won and played a club to the queen and club for the king and ace, West exiting with a spade which meant the contract was five down, -1100 and a massive 18 IMP swing.

West led the $\bigstar3$ and declarer won with the \bigstarQ and played back the 6, never a good sign for the defenders. West ducked, won the next spade and switched to the $\heartsuit8$. Alas, the bird had flown. Declarer took the $\heartsuit K$ and played two rounds of spades, West winning and exiting with the $\heartsuit6$. Having taken the \heartsuit A declarer advanced the \bigstarQ and had 10 tricks, +630.

A recent thread on Bridgewinners discusses the

adage that with an opening bid opposite an opening bid you should make sure you reach game, suggesting that the modern style of opening light makes it unreliable. Perhaps so, but this was the only table where NS stopped short.

West led the $\heartsuit6$ and declarer won with the \heartsuitK , played a diamond to the ace, cashed the \heartsuitA for a diamond discard, ran the \clubsuitQ , played a club to the ten, cashed the \bigstarA and exited with a spade. When West ducked the $\bigstar6$, declarer cashed the \bigstarA and exited with the $\bigstar7$ (a diamond gets an extra trick) West winning and playing the \diamondsuitQ which East overtook to play the \heartsuitQ , West discarding when declarer ruffed with the $\bigstar9$, leaving him with the $\bigstarK5$ over declarer's $\bigstarQ4$, +140 but a 10 IMP loss.


East led the $\diamond 4$ and declarer took the third round of the suit, ran the $\clubsuit Q$ and then played a spade to the queen, West winning and exiting with the $\heartsuit 6$. Declarer won with the king, cashed the $\bigstar A$ and continued with the $\bigstar 9$, but West won and returned the $\bigstar 5$ and declarer had to lose a club at the end, -100.

At double dummy declarer takes a second club finesse and then plays two rounds of spades, easily arriving at nine tricks.

West led the $\diamond 6$ and having won the second round of the suit with the $\diamond Q$, he switched to the $\heartsuit 8$. Declarer won with the $\heartsuit K$ and played a club for the queen and king, East exiting with a diamond to dummy's ace. When the spade finesse lost, West exited with a heart and when declarer played a third round of the suit he was three down, -150 and 5 IMPs worse off.



East led the \clubsuit K and having won with the ace and ruffed a club declarer played on hearts, taking all the tricks, +510 but a loss of 12 IMPs.

It was a similar story in France Vinciguerra v Poland Andrzejki, the former playing in 6NT doubled for +1230 while conceding 450 in the other room for a 13 IMP swing.

West led the $\heartsuit 5$ and declarer won with the $\heartsuit 9$ and played a diamond for the queen and ace. When East continued with the $\heartsuit 3$ declarer could win with dummy's $\heartsuit 10$, draw trumps and dispose of dummy's spades on the $\heartsuit AKQ$ for +1540 and 17 IMPs.

In my main match, USA Seligman led 33.1-24 at half time. All the matches were close, the biggest lead being that of France Bessis over Poland Olimpia which stood at 25.1 IMPs

East led the \heartsuit 6 and West took the ace and switched to the \bigstar 6, declarer winning with the \bigstar K and exiting with the \bigstar 8, West winning and playing back a heart. Declarer won, cashed three more hearts and then ran the \diamondsuit 10, East winning and playing the \bigstar Q for one down, -100.

Having taken the $\bigstar K$, declarer could cash the \bigstar A, ruff a club and then run the $\Diamond 10.$ East wins, but


declarer will be able to draw trumps and dispose of a spade on a diamond.

To prevent this, West must withhold the $\heartsuit A$. Declarer wins in dummy, cashes the $\clubsuit A$, ruffs a club and runs the $\diamondsuit 10$ but East wins and must switch to a spade, West again withholding an ace!





Another spade saw North win with the \bigstar 5 and exit with a diamond, but declarer won with the ten, played a club to the queen and another spade. He won the heart return, overtook the \diamondsuit Q and cashed his winners, +600.

Only an unattractive initial lead of the $\clubsuit6$ will defeat 3NT.



Here too South started with two rounds of hearts, and declarer ruffed North's king as before, took two rounds of trumps, pitched the $\clubsuit9$ on the \heartsuit J, ruffed a heart and then exited with the \diamondsuit J, North winning and exiting with the $\heartsuit10$. Declarer ruffed and played the \diamondsuit Q. If he had discarded from dummy North would have been endplayed, but when he ruffed with dum-

my's A and played a club he could not avoid two losers in the suit and was one down, -50 and 10 IMPs, sealing a magnificent comeback by the Masters who had taken the session 41-6.



Declarer ruffed in dummy, ruffed the $\heartsuit 10$ and played a club to the ten, ensuring 10 tricks, one down, -100.

Declarer took dummy's $\bigstar AQ$, pitched a club on the $\heartsuit J$, ruffed a heart, ruffed a diamond, ruffed a heart, ran the $\bigstar 8$ to North's $\bigstar 10$ (if North's clubs had been $\bigstar K109$ South would have wished he had played the $\bigstar J$; note declare could also have pitched a club on the $\heartsuit 10$, endplaying North) and played low on the club return, +420 and 8 IMPs for the Austrians who had turned the match around, winning the session 38-6.
