East led the $\bigstar9$ for the queen, king and three, and when West continued with the $\bigstar10$ declarer won in dummy and ran the $\Diamond Q$, East winning and exiting with the $\bigstar8$. Declarer won, played a club for the ten and king, and when the $\diamond4$ was returned he put in the $\diamond10$, East winning and cashing the $\bigstar7$ for one down, -100.

Taking the diamond suit in isolation, the best line for four tricks is to start by playing a low card towards the queen. If that loses you finesse the ten on the next round, scoring four tricks 28% of the time.

Whatever, it meant the loss of 11 IMPs, leaving the session score at 28-28. Would Austria's carry over of 0.1 have a role to play?

Declarer took three rounds of hearts discarding two clubs, ruffed a heart, ruffed a club and pitched a diamond on a heart, South ruffing, cashing the $\bigstar J$ and exiting with a club which left declarer relying on a well-placed $\Diamond A$, one down, -50.

If declarer had relied upon the principle of restricted choice and ruffed a club after cashing the A, he would have come to 10 tricks. The only consolation being the thought that an unlikely lead of the Q would have defeated the contract.





Declarer could have achieved that result by playing the $\blacklozenge Q$ rather than a heart.

You don't see someone break the Kokish Relay by not bidding $2\clubsuit$, but it is a possibility. It is a good idea to agree that responder will have at least one top honour (A/K/Q). It is possible to play transfers – South could bid $3\clubsuit$ to show diamonds, with North only competing the transfer with a fit.

West led the \clubsuit J and declarer went up with dummy's ace, cashed the top hearts discarding clubs and played a spade, East taking the \bigstar A and exiting with the \diamond 5. Declarer won with dummy's \diamond 7, played a heart, ruffed by East with the \diamond 9 and overruffed by declarer who claimed, +920.

West led the $\heartsuit3$ for the ten, jack and ace and declarer continued with the $\clubsuit8$, East winning with the $\clubsuit10$ and switching to the $\diamondsuit4$. West won with the queen, but failed to return a diamond which would have ensured one down, instead returning the $\clubsuit9$ for the jack and king. Declarer ruffed the club continuation and played two rounds of spades, but East won and played the \clubsuitA . Declarer ruffed in dummy pitching a diamond, cashed the $\bigstar0$ and took the diamond finesse, but that meant he was one down, -100.

Once the defenders had missed the diamond ruff a

winning line was available. Declarer must ruff a heart in dummy and play the riangle Q for the king and ace. He can then play two rounds of spades discarding a diamond, and West will be endplayed.

The early play was identical to that in the other room, but having won the $\Diamond Q$ West switched back to hearts, declarer discarding a club from dummy, winning with the $\heartsuit 9$ and then pitching another club on the $\heartsuit K$. If West had returned the $\diamond 2$ at trick three, East could have continued with a low club and then ruffed another diamond for two down.

With the last two boards offering little scope Austria had done more than enough to win the session and the match, while Poland I held on to their slender lead.
